SUMMER PROGRAMS FOR STUDENTS AT THE SJCOE

BIOTECHNOLOGY AND MICROSCOPY

Microscopy Bootcamp | Grades 6-8 | June 19-21 | \$175 (*includes lunch***)** Students will be exposed to hands-on Microscopy activities. They will learn how to keep a laboratory research notebook.

Biotech Bootcamp | Grades 6-8 | June 24-26 | \$175 (includes lunch)

This is a fun, introductory class using the powerful Mindstorms Lego EV3 robotics system. Students will explore electrical and engineering concepts, build various robots with different sensors, and use the computer to program their robots to respond to sensors and perform desired tasks.

Advanced Lego WeDo 2.0 | Grades 2-5 | July 22-25 | \$90

This advanced workshop will present building and coding challenges including problem solving as students have fun learning to build and program LEGO We Do 2.0 robotic devices. Engineering concepts and creating computer code will be explored to design and program robots. *Students are recommended to have taken a previous class or have prior experience with WeDo 2.0*

Advanced Robotics with Lego EV3 | Grades 6-12 | July 22-25 | \$180

This is a fun, advanced class using the powerful Mindstorms LEGO EV3 robotics system. Students will explore electrical and engineering concepts, build various robots with different sensors, and use the computer to program their robots to respond to sensors and perform desired tasks including advanced problem solving.

ASIAN AMERICAN & PACIFIC ISLANDER HERITAGE MONTH

"One Endless Voice to Enhance Our Traditions"



In recognition of the contributions to our nation's rich and diverse cultural heritage, San Joaquin County Office of Education celebrates May as Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month.

The 2019 theme is One Endless Voice to Enhance Our Traditions.

"Our Attitude towards immigration reflects our faith in the American ideal." - John F. Kennedy

HISTORY:

From the early 1800s to the 21st century, Asian and Pacific peoples have played a vital role in the development of the United States and have made lasting contributions in all elements of American society. Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month takes place in May and is a celebration of the cultures, traditions, and history of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States. A rather broad term, Asian-Pacific encompasses all of the Asian continent and the Pacific islands of Melanesia (New Guinea, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji and the Solomon Islands), Micronesia (Marianas, Guam, Wake Island, Palau, Marshall Islands, Kiribati, Nauru and the Federated States of Micronesia) and Polynesia (New Zealand, Hawaiian Islands, Rotuma, Midway Islands, Samoa, American Samoa, Tonga, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, French Polynesia and Easter Island).

In June 1977, Representatives Frank Horton of New York and Norman Y. Mineta of California introduced a House resolution that called upon the president to proclaim the first ten days of May as Asian-Pacific Heritage Week. The following month, Senators Daniel Inouye and Spark Matsunaga introduced a similar bill in the Senate. Both were passed. On October 5, 1978, President Jimmy Carter signed a Joint Resolution designating the annual celebration. Twelve years later, President George H.W. Bush signed an extension making the week-long celebration into a month-long celebration. In 1992, the official designation of May as Asian-Pacific American Heritage Month was signed into law.

PURPOSE:

The month of May was chosen to commemorate the immigration of the first Japanese to the United States on May 7, 1843, and to mark the anniversary of the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad on May 10, 1869. The majority of the workers who laid the tracks were Chinese immigrants.
